
Worshipping Together



RECEIVING

Reading: John 15:1-8

At first glance this passage is about punishing those Christian's who fail to obey God's commandments and lose touch with the life of the Holy Spirit. But, in order to understand better what Jesus is saying, we need to know more about how to encourage a vine to produce fruit. Palestine was and still is a wine producer. Those listening to Jesus would be fairly familiar with viticulture. Vines do not produce the same amount of fruit every year. The grower doesn't cut down a vine if it's had a bad year. He encourages it to grow better the following year. Grapevines, if left unattended, will grow along the ground, and if left lying on the ground, will send little roots down into the soil rather than produce any fruit. They may produce a few tiny clusters of bitter grapes this way, but since they are trying to draw nutrients from the soil where their own roots cannot get deep enough, they will not produce grapes.

Before throwing away these unproductive branches, the grower will lift them off the ground. He knows that what they need is not to draw their own nutrients from the soil, but to get their nutrients from the vine. Similarly, God the vintner, rather than cut us off when we don't produce fruit, lifts us up where we can bask in the sun, and get nutrients from the vine. This is the process that Jesus is referring to when he talks of 'abiding' in him. True believers are lifted to the sun so that they can grow in faith as promised in verse 7: 'if you abide in me and my words abide in you, ask for whatever you wish and it will be done for you'.

These words seem to stress the importance of prayer as part of our daily Christian life. We need to pray to discover in which direction God wants our little branch to grow. Just as new vine branches take a while to settle and bear fruit, so new Christians, and sometimes, comfortable settled Christians, find it hard to know where to go to next. They move in various directions until they find the way God wants them to follow if they are to bear fruit for Christ. No Christian is good at everything: preaching, music, counselling, visiting, evangelising.... The list is long and we have to work out what we're good at, what God wants of us and then concentrate on that. God would rather have a few clusters of large, juicy grapes than lots of clusters of small, bitter grapes.

The one thing we are not allowed to do is 'nothing'. We also must understand that abiding in Christ is more than just believing in Him. 1 John points out that to abide, you must also love one another (1 John 2:10; 3:15; 4:12), walk as Jesus walked (2:6), be strong in the faith (2:14, 24), and do the will of God (2:17; 3:24). Here is what Jesus is saying in verse 4-5. Fruit is not automatic. However, you cannot produce fruit on your own effort either. Only the vine produces fruit. Only Jesus produces fruit in our lives.

So what is our responsibility? How can we allow Jesus to do this? Abide in Him. Trust him to produce fruit in us as we love other Christians and live as Jesus lived. Continue to trust that as we allow the Word of God to dwell in us richly, Jesus will follow through on his promise to us and we will produce much fruit.

If we do not 'abide', what happens? We are not burnt at the stake! Notice the pronoun switch in verse 6. 'They' throw the unproductive branches in the fire. Who are 'they'? One good theory is that 'they' represents the world of non-believers or seekers of belief. The world is looking for fruit among Christians. They are looking to see if we really act like we say we will. And sadly, what they most often see is far removed from what we claim to be. Many of them have read the Scriptures, and they know what Christ stood for. So, when the world looks at us, do they see Christ? If not, if they say: 'the Christians are no different to us, so why should we believe?', then this is like throwing the unproductive branches of the vine onto a fire. It is, like much of Christ's teaching, a metaphor. If we do not reveal changed lives, if we do

not show love for others or even for our fellow Christians, the world doesn't care a whit about what we have to say. They just put us in the discard pile for burning. Churches would be much more effective at evangelism if they were much more effective at loving one another. That is what the world hungers for. That is the what the world wants to see. That is when they will give us a hearing. That is also when we will fully abide in the love of God.

RESPONDING

We use Fred Kaan's hymn as our prayer of intercession: StF 696³

Reading: John 15:9-17

In this passage Jesus commands us to love one other because he has done the greatest thing that love can do. He has come to give us freedom and joy, not slavery. We are chosen by the one who has loved us more than we can begin to imagine. Jesus says I have called you friends not servants.

Friendship is a choice and involves communication between those involved as the friends get to know each other better. Similarly, following Jesus is a continuous process where we get to know him better and learn more of his ways of love and compassion.

Where daily life is busy and we are surrounded by technology it is easy to be distracted and not give our full attention to our family and friends or to new people we meet. How often do we see people walking along a road or sitting on a bench engrossed in their phones and ignoring each other? The same can happen with our time with God. Do we lose our time for prayer or Bible study as other things crowd in? One of the silver linings of lockdown has been the number of resources that have been made available by different churches and worship leaders whether online, on paper or TV and radio. These provide opportunities for us to take a bit more quiet time for reflection and learning. Also during the times when the only opportunity to get out of the house was for exercise, it gave scope for prayer for ourselves or the community and listening to God while walking.

Some human friendships can be high maintenance where one person seems to have to work harder than the other to keep things going. The good news is that the terms for following Jesus are straightforward, although not easy, we are called to 'love one another as I have loved you'. Love is less about feelings and more about action. Jesus chooses us to bear fruit that will last. This might be a life changed because we loved them as Jesus loved us or a seemingly small task we did that made a difference to someone's life. At this time it is more important than ever to be aware of those people, who are feeling lonely and excluded and in need of friendship, and to take the opportunities to be good fruit that will last.

How can we ensure that we give those we meet our full attention, as Jesus did with those people he encountered?

Just a few days ago, we remembered and celebrated the day when Jesus ascended into heaven. We are reminded in Luke's Gospel that Jesus led the disciples out as far as Bethany and it was from there, after blessing them, that he was carried up to Heaven. The image that I, and perhaps you have, is that they were standing on a hillside. There were no crowds, no noise, no fanfare, or no singing choirs of angels, there was just silence. But then, when I reflect on those events, I hear two voices.

The first is Jesus's, who according to St Matthew said to the disciples "All authority in heaven and on earth has been given to me. Therefore, go and make disciples of all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit, and teaching them to obey everything I have commanded you. And surely, I am with you always, to the very end of the age."

And the second was one of the two men in white robes who had suddenly stood by them, and said "Men of Galilee, why do you stand here looking into the sky?".

That question seems to have a critical tone. It sounds as if the speaker disapproved that the disciples were doing nothing. But perhaps my view is influenced by an incident that happened when I was studying for my A Levels. My form, called 6G, had been assigned a very new, inexperienced teacher. We were giving him a hard time, everyone was misbehaving, the class was in bedlam, no-one was working. Suddenly everything went quiet as we all noticed the Headmaster standing in the doorway. Into the quiet, his voice echoed "6G, why are you standing there looking at me? Sit down and get on with your work or else there will be no half term for you! Mr. Philips, my study at lunchtime!" We quickly sat down and got on with our work.

But let us hear now how the disciples reacted to the question they were asked.

Reading ACTS Ch. 1 v 12-15 (ending before "and said"), and v23- 26".

I cannot help but be amused that, after praying, the first thing the disciples did, was not to go out to the Temple, or the streets of Jerusalem to tell the world about the love of God as Jesus had charged them to do, instead they had a Church Council Meeting!

But when I think more about the disciples in those days after Jesus' ascension, I cannot help but make a comparison of how they emerged from the Upper Room where they have been hiding and sheltering since Good Friday, with the way we are also slowly emerging from sheltering from the effects of the Pandemic.

The disciples knew because Jesus had said, "I am with you always, to the very end of the age" that this was a new world in which they could and should proclaim the love of God. I wonder how we will face the challenges ahead of us.

Will we be transfixed, unsure what and how to worship and to spread the love of God? Will be challenged like the disciples "why do you stand looking into the sky?". Or will we, with the knowledge that Jesus is also with us, "go and proclaim the gospel", perhaps in new and exciting ways.

Today, I wonder which voice will we hear?

Reading: Acts 2:1-4

On the front page of this month's Worshipping Together booklet is a painting from the Methodist Modern Art Collection entitled 'Pentecost' by Dennis Hawkins, painted in 1962. The following commentary explains why Hawkins calls the panting 'Pentecost', and how this work of art is part of a much larger series.

The descent of the Holy Spirit, on the Jewish feast of Pentecost, marked the birth of the Church, and is represented by an intense circle of white light, painted on the top of an old school desk. In this way Hawkins represents the success of the Church penetrating unlikely nooks and crannies and dark corners throughout the world and illuminating them with the light of the Holy Ghost. In the 1960s Hawkins produced dozens of "Pentecosts". The traditional iconography of Pentecost was tongues of fire, but instead he chose to use the circle or sphere. He saw it as a numinous object, mysterious without beginning or end and all-embracing, an ideal symbol for the coming of the Holy Spirit.¹⁴

I love way Hawkins demonstrates the coming of God's Spirit in this endless and timeless way, echoing the truth that while we have the Acts 2 Pentecost, God's spirit is at the beginning in Genesis, and through many different images and metaphors threads its way throughout scripture, throughout time, And throughout our very lives.

I also love the way this sphere of light appears as graffiti on 'normal' objects to the 1960s world. From being an ordinary day to day object, this old school desk is now marked and becomes something unique and special, carrying a hallmark of the lifegiving, all-embracing spirit of God.

This image, this art, this metaphor, reminds us that today, Pentecost, is not merely a day where we may read Acts 2 and be reminded of the story we sometimes call

the birth of the early church. Today is a day where we remember and celebrate the timeless, endless, all-embracing and life-giving presence of God — which we know as God's Spirit, that rests on and within each of us — ordinary people, who become marked, special and unique, carrying the hallmark of the all-embracing presence and power of God everywhere we go.

Today is Trinity Sunday, a week after Pentecost when the Holy Spirit came, and is often referred to as the Birth of the early church. It can be tempting to think of Trinity Sunday as a theological Rubik's Cube, difficult to solve!! With our benefit of hindsight we have grown up with the knowledge of God, as three in one:-

Father – Son – Holy Spirit.

Sing, pray & proclaim: Holy Spirit we welcome you¹⁸

- 1. Holy Spirit, we welcome you, Holy Spirit, we welcome you! Move among us with holy fire, as we lay aside all earthly desire, hands reach out and our hearts aspire. Holy Spirit, Holy Spirit, We welcome you!
- 2. Holy Spirit, we welcome you, Holy Spirit, we welcome you! Let the breeze of your presence blow that your children here might truly know how to move in the Spirit's flow.

Holy Spirit, Holy Spirit, we welcome you!

3. Holy Spirit, we welcome you, Holy Spirit, we welcome you! Please accomplish in us today some new work of loving grace, we pray — unreservedly — have your way.

Holy Spirit, Holy Spirit, we welcome you!

We can enter your presence because through Jesus life, death and resurrection He opened the door to the Kingdom of Grace.

We thank you, that no matter who we are, whatever mistakes we have made, Your Grace makes it possible, for us to begin again.

So we come today bringing thanks and praise, for you call us by name, and we are members of your family. Amen

Reading: John 2:1-17

Tomorrow is Spring Bank Holiday, I wonder what you will do? Before things were changed, and dates changed, it would have been Whit Monday, the day after Pentecost. In the North where I grew up there would have been big processions of Witness when churches carried banners and young children wore new clothes, to celebrate the coming of the Holy Spirit. That tradition has mostly gone now.

Nicodemus comes to Jesus by night, perhaps because he is a leader of Pharisees and didn't want others to know he was seeing Jesus, he could have been put out of the Synagogue (see John 9:22). Nicodemus has recognised that Jesus has come from God and wants to know more. Jesus tells him he must be "Born again" a phrase that is now often used when someone has a conversion experience.

How can one be born again asks Nicodemus if one is old"?? The statement baffles him. Jesus tells him he must be born of Water and Spirit. If he wants to enter the Kingdom of Heaven.

So does age have something which might prevent us from entering the kingdom of heaven?? Do we see a life of Faith as maturing expertise and knowledge, does it preclude a "New Beginning"? It is in knowing God for ourselves, not just from the Bible or our Worship, that we can be drawn into a relationship. How can we meet with God in the here and now??

God is everywhere, hidden in plain sight, daily we see his handiwork, and in others that we meet. We can build a relationship with him. What might it feel like to have the "new beginning" that being born again suggests?? Vulnerable??". You will be in Good Company! There are no experts on God!! We are all beginners, but we are urged to continue searching.

Jesus said: 'Ask and it will be given you - Seek and you will find — Knock and the door will be opened'. What better advice on building a relationship. Jesus is insistent that it is the process of being born of the spirit, that makes God's plan for the world possible. We have the opportunity to be part of that process. Amen
